

Community Futures (CF) is a national economic development program supported in western Canada by Prairies Economic Development Canada. Community Futures are nonprofit organizations guided by volunteer boards of directors and staffed with business professionals. Together, CF staff and community volunteers are actively engaged in

helping develop and implement community-based economic development and diversification strategies. These strategies create growth within our rural communities one idea at a time.

ACCESS TO CAPITAL - CF organizations (CFs) are developmental lenders. Priority is given to viable business ideas that result in wealth generation for the business and economic development for the community or region. CFs may invest in qualified business projects to a maximum of \$150,000.00. Terms and borrowing rates are competitive and tied to the cash flow of the business.

BUSINESS SERVICES - CF provide a wide range of coaching, training and technical assistance to businesses, including support with business planning.

STRATEGIC COMMUNITY PLANNING & SUPPORT - For rural communities to continue to compete in a fast-changing world full of economic uncertainties, they must adopt new economic development strategies. These strategies must be focused and intentional, but also flexible enough to allow the community to capture new opportunities presented by a truly global market place. CF organizations provide essential community support, and at times, community strategic planning leadership. Additionally, all CFs have access to special project funding designed to assist communities in successfully implementing identified economic diversification strategies.

13TH ANNUAL WOMEN IN THE NORTH CONFERENCE 2021

SUMMARY — The 2021 WIN Conference was held throughout the week of April 19th to 23rd in a Lunch & Learn format from 11:45am to 1pm every day. It was delivered virtually via the Zoom platform with speakers presenting from their own home bases. We had 157 registered delegates and a total of 84 individual attendees over the course of the week. Sessions were recorded and sent out to the delegates the following week. There were 68 unique views of the videos which tells us some people who registered but did not attend the live sessions, watched the recordings afterwards. Even though it was a virtual event we tried to keep the same format as in previous years in the way of keynote speakers, breakout sessions and the ever-popular talk show with local women entrepreneurs. Delegates were encouraged to network via the chat function after the sessions and were kept up to date on the daily event through email announcements.

LET'S TALK SHOW — One hour of candid conversation with *Roxeanne Alexander* of Riverside Ranch Décor in Grimshaw, *Leah Fox* of Brave Culture Fitness in Fairview and *Trina Moyles* author of Women Who Dig and Lookout. The show was hosted by former CF Business Analyst Deb Kalyn.

KEYNOTES

Kristen Cumming of Cantos Performance Management -This session helped leaders understand their role and purpose when supporting people during volatile conditions. Content covered how to get clarity for yourself and for others, how to remain connected and resilient and how to commit to decisions and actions while working through a pandemic. She talked about the purpose of leadership during turbulent times and the opportunities that turbulence provides.

Jenifer Horvath of Heartlifted - In this session Jenifer covered how stress and anxiety biologically impacts ones' executive abilities, ways to manage that biological system for improved mental functioning,

what leadership competencies you need in a volatile and uncertain world, tools to better prioritize and make decisions, and that there is hope and opportunity in these challenging times.

Beckie Scott Olympic Champion - Beckie spoke about her journey from the ski trails of Vermilion, AB to the top of the Olympic podium, and into the board-rooms of international sport politics. It is a story of courage, resilience and valuesbased leadership, with an important moral message. From her early days of learning to ski in her parent's backyard to becoming a leading voice for global athletes' rights and fairness through the Russian doping crisis, to her present-day role as Founder and CEO of a sport-for-development charity.

Lunch & Learn – A Two Part Webinar Series

How Technology & the Internet Affect Our Health & Wellness with Ariel Haubrich, M. Ed Psych.




WIN/RRRF Coordinator

The Beauty Bar & Co. - Peace River, AB | Angelica Alberto



Angelica Alberto is the CEO and founder of The Beauty Bar & Co. At 19 years of age, she began as a lash artist while a full time university student. In 2019, The Beauty Bar & Co. was created. Angelica and her team specialized in lash extensions, clinical facials and laser hair removal. Then in December 2021 the 'Social Beauty House' was established. The Social Beauty House is a space that invites all women entrepreneurs in the beauty and wellness industry to be their own boss. The space has a hair salon with 3 chairs as well as 3 suites available for lease. CFPC provided funds for leasehold improvements and operating capital. This young, dynamic entrepreneur has a rosy future and CFPC will be there to support her.



Krazy Acres Trucking Ltd. - Peace River, AB | Alissa & Leon Bremmer



In early 2019, after 5 years driving for a crude haul company, Leon and Alissa Bremmer decided that their future would be in ownership of a trucking business rather than Leon driving for someone else. They leased a 2010 Peterbilt, arranged for a \$75,000 revolving loan through ATB and then set out to secure a contract with Baytex Energy to haul crude oil. They soon discovered this was not as easy as they had first assumed. After working for 7 months to meet Baytex requirements, including truck and shop modifications, as

well as additional training for Leon, they found themselves in a cash crunch, with ATB unable to offer further assistance. That's when they were referred to CFPC. We provided them with the operating capital they required to successfully launch a contract with Baytex Energy. Since then, CFPC has support them as they secured a second truck and replaced the original 2010. The future looks good for these entrepreneurs and CFPC is proud to continue to support them.
